

## Space Exploration Alliance 2006 Budget Week Action Plan

## Who We Are

## **SEA Vision**

We support the Vision for Space Exploration as a bold and substantial mandate for human and robotic exploration of the solar system that will help assure American technological and scientific preeminence in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

## Fully Support the Vision's Plan and Financial Requirements

Space exploration is and should be a national priority for the United States. The exploration of space drives innovation; increases student interest in science and mathematics; creates jobs; improves national security, and fosters a feeling of wonder among children and adults alike. In addition, it will dramatically increase our knowledge of the universe and begin the process of opening new worlds for humanity.

RECOMMENDATION: Congress should provide the funding for what it has charged NASA to implement in the 2005 NASA Authorization Act.

- This level of funding should be greater than the President's FY 2007 budget request, and should be closer to the \$17.9 billion of the authorization versus the \$16.8 billion in the President's budget.
- Congress should strongly consider using a guide of <u>one percent</u> of the federal budget for future NASA appropriations. The current level has shrunk to 0.7%. This floor was exceeded throughout the post-Apollo era until the mid-nineties.

RECOMMENDATION: Congress should use additional funds to enable NASA to connect current work with the future human <u>exploration of Mars</u>, such as through the methane engine development program.

RECOMMENDATION: Congress should also use additional funds to develop the <u>Centennial Challenges program</u>, the <u>Terrestrial Planet Finder</u> mission, and a dedicated probe of <u>Europa</u>.

RECOMMENDATION: Congress should protect the budget line for <u>Commercial Orbital Transportation Services</u>. This is currently set at approximately \$500 million over the five year budget run out.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Congress should encourage NASA to broaden and define <u>international participation</u> in the Vision.
